From the Interim Senior Pastor

What's Required of Us?

When you ask that question of church people, you might get any one of several ready answers. Some might say the main thing required of us is to be a friendly group, the kind others might want to join. Some might say the main requirement for a church is to keep its building and property in good shape, so it will not only serve us now but be there for others after us. Some might say it's to keep the budget balanced, no matter what. In an interim period, many might feel that tops on the list of what's required is to get that search committee going, the sooner the better! And those familiar enough with Scripture to know the voice of the prophets might recall the beautiful words of Micah 6:6 – “and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?”

There is something important and true in all these responses. I want to suggest another one to think about. I want to suggest that at the most elemental spiritual level, what is required of us as people of faith, what we are responsible for, is not what we think we are responsible for – outcomes. That we are, instead, responsible first for the quality of our journey with God, and the quality of our attentiveness, our faithfulness and our courage, which may or may not get us the results we (think we) are after. Letting go of our desired control of results and outcomes, and trusting that God is at work no matter how things are, is so very hard for many of us, reluctant as we are to admit that, well, we don't already know everything. Parker Palmer, Quaker activist, teacher and writer, puts it this way:

What God requires of those who call on God's name is responsive servanthood. God wishes to act in and through us, so Christian hope does not relieve men and women of responsibility. But we are not primarily responsible for shrewd analysis of problems, for strategic selection of means, for maximizing the chances of success. We are primarily responsible for turning to God, for attempting to know and do God's will. That may well lead us into actions which are not shrewd, strategic or successful, as the life of Jesus suggests. But as Jesus' life also demonstrates, human action which is faithful to God's will can have transforming effect. (The Company of Strangers)

There's a good place to start Lent, and a good way to remind ourselves of the deep wisdom that underlies all transition, change and journey, for churches and otherwise: *we are primarily responsible for turning to God, for attempting to know and do God's will.* That trust may or may not lead to a particular outcome we thought or hoped was coming. It will most certainly lead to a deeper knowing of God, and things always change from there.

To put it another way: What are churches for? *They are for teaching us how to turn to God. They are for teaching us responsive servanthood, and for giving us the company of each other on the way to learning and doing God's will.* Everything else falls into place after that.

I am wondering how you and I are going to discover in the coming months how it is that we are turning to God, and what kinds of blessing we will find because of it...?

DECEMBER 2009 TREASURER'S REPORT

Income exceeded expenses in December by over \$5300, so the church ended 2009 with a deficit of just over \$2400, significantly less than last year's deficit. That will be carried over as we begin 2010.

On the income side, we ended up the year very close to the current year pledge line item and fairly close on most of the other income lines, but the unpledged income ended the year at only 49% of the budgeted figure.

The committee chairs are to be commended for excellent expense control in 2009. Without their careful attention to detail, our deficit could have been much larger!

Our endowment funds earned over \$23,000 during the past month, and the total value of these funds increased nearly \$220,000 throughout 2009, due to the generosity of our members contributions to the Capital Campaign and to the improved performance of the stock market.

The **X, Y and Z's** of recycling:

Xmas lights. You can ship your old lights to HolidayLEDS.com, Attention: Recycling Program, 120 W. Michigan Avenue, Suite 1403, Jackson MI 49201. The company will send you a coupon for 10% off its LED lights which use 80 percent less energy. They also give off less heat which is safer.

Yogurt cups. Many towns don't recycle because of the type of plastic. Stoneyfield Farm has launched a program that turns them into toothbrushes, razors and other products. Mail to Stoneyfield Farm, 10 Burton Dr., Londonderry NH 03053.

Zipped plastic bags. Towns that recycle plastic bags will accept these as long as they are clean, dry and the zipper part has been snipped off.

New Haven Association Spirituality Program

The Rev. Lee Ireland and The Rev. Susan Fowler will lead a New Haven Association-wide 4-part spirituality program "The Gifts of the Four Seasons" in 2010 to open up the joys of exploring our spirituality and "having the courageous conversation" with God.
